

Restoring the Lost Temple —

As social chaos sweeps the Middle East, the 'lost temple' offers inspiration for present and future forms of community life. In ancient society civil harmony proceeded from temple ritual and union with the divine. In *The Temple Legend* of Christian Rosenkreutz we encounter the debasement of the temple by three antisocial forces. As human freedom unfolds, the temple is lost.

In this evening we shall follow the fall of the Golden Age with specific examples of changes of consciousness through several cultural epochs. Additionally, we shall offer indications for restoring the lost temple through inner development and outer transformation. How can the quest for Anthroposophia, the spirit of the universally human, and a new form of community life reveal enduring secrets of the Temple of Solomon?

David Lenker lectured at Emerson College (England), as well as Waldorf Schools in Boston, Buffalo, Washington, D.C., Oregon, Pennsylvania, and Vermont. He holds a degree in Latin from Dickinson College, offers classes on the awareness of one's humanity, and leads spiritual geography tours of the Susquehanna Valley. He is chairman of The Corps de Michael and was a founding teacher of Susquehanna Waldorf School.
